'Trouble Songs' - Peace and Conflict in Belfast


Trouble Songs is about music and stories from contemporary Belfast. This performance weaves together memory, comedy and hard-hitting prose. Three of Belfast's creative champions have joined across the divides to tell you the story of how music can challenge given histories and can provide a shared, dynamic outlet.

Stuart Bailie, Joby Fox and Ursula Burns have lived through a pivotal time in Irish history. They were born into one of the bloodiest and most protracted conflicts in contemporary Europe. They have encountered hurt and pain but also darkly funny situations. Troubled Songs examines how you can survive emotionally, how you make friends with enemies, and how you shed the labels you are born with to find your own truth.

In recent years, Belfast has provided the world with a blueprint beyond conflict. The peace agreement of 1998 has sustained with the critical support of the city's artists, writers and imaginative thinkers.

Stuart Bailie is a music journalist, BBC broadcaster and author of 'Trouble Songs: Music and Conflict in Northern Ireland'. Ursula Burns, aka 'The Dangerous Harpist', is a songwriter, performer and comedienne. Joby Fox, is a writer, performer, film-maker and humanitarian activist. Collectively, this trio summons up words, sentiments and melodies that bear witness to trouble and transcendence.

The show journeys through a conflict of identity and turmoil into peace, and reflect on this journey now 20 years after the signing of the historical peace agreement in Belfast.

About the music:

Music has been key in breaking down barriers and rebuilding society throughout the Northern Irish conflict. Musicians have been some of the bravest in Northern Ireland crossing the lines before any one else dared, leading the way. For that reason it is only natural that we look towards some of these musicians to help us understand how a society falls into deep division and how it emerges back out of it.

Contemporary folk and pop, and the traditional sounds of Ireland are at the roots of the vibrant music and songs from both Burns and Fox. Multi-instrumentalists, singers and songwriters who master their craft as both performers and storytellers.

About the book:

Trouble Songs – Music and Conflict in Northern Ireland sets the scene for the musical journey. Gripping stories and firsthand interviews with Christy Moore, the Undertones. Stiff Little Fingers and a number of international acts who visited the region when only a few bands would. The book focuses on songs inspired by the Troubles, including Paul McCartney's *Give* Ireland Back to the Irish and Zombie by The Cranberries. Among the highlights is an exclusive contribution by U2 frontman Bono, who writes about the Dublin and Monaghan bombings, the lyrics to Sunday Bloody Sunday, the Enniskillen bomb and his work with Christy Moore.






PROFILES:



Stuart Bailie is a music writer and broadcaster, based in Belfast, Northern Ireland. He has been a music industry professional for over 30 years, writing for NME, Mojo, Uncut, Q, Vox, The Times, The Irish Times, Classic Rock and Hot Press. He wrote the authorised story of Thin Lizzy, The Ballad of the Thin Man, in 1997. He has written TV and radio documentaries on U2, Elvis Costello, Glen Campbell and Thin Lizzy. He wrote and narrated a BBC TV history of music from Northern Ireland, So Hard to Beat, in 2007. He is a co-founder of the Oh Yeah Music Centre in Belfast and was its CEO from 2008-16. Joby Fox is known as an authentic voice of post-conflict Ireland, but he also as a humanitarian activist, and immersed himself in the refugee crisis in Greece. Joby has a long history in music from the Punk era to UK chart topping with his Celtic rock bank Energy Orchard, to his solo career as a crafty writer and performer. His End of the War music and film show opened the inaugural UN Peace Festival in Hong Kong in 2014.
